Expanding to High School

# It's elementary, my dear...high school needs were not being met.

Since the beginning of Horizons for Youth in 1990, our programs have focused on students from Kindergarten through eighth grade. With a 100% high school graduation rate and an 80% college attendance rate, we have continually demonstrated that any child can achieve their potential if given the right tools and the necessary support. However, even as our graduated 8th graders gained acceptance into top high schools throughout Chicago, we recognized that our students still faced significant financial, academic and personal challenges during those critical 4 years of high school. So we went to work and developed the Horizons for Youth High School Program that continued our K-8 efforts.

During the summer of 2009, we launched the program for 20 of our students by offering an intense 5-week summer session that developed our students' writing skills while honing in on the essential elements for high school success such as note-taking, time management, goal-setting and group dynamics. After laying the foundation for our students' success, we are able to continue offering the cornerstones of our programs to the high school students: scholarships, one-on-one mentoring and enrichment programs. Additionally, our High School Program offers our students high school test preparation and readiness training, tutoring, writing workshops, skill building, college campus visits, college admissions test preparation and financial aid guidance for college. What a gift to allow these students an opportunity to expand their own horizons.

# Get with the Program. It's key to our success.

The foundation of our organization lies with scholarships to enable children to attend quality schools and our big sibling program that provides one-on-one mentoring to each of our student participants.

The mentor pairs participate in organization-sponsored activities once each month, and they meet on their own at least one other time per month. But in order to allow each child the opportunity to achieve his or her full potential, we've recognized that offering additional programs is essential to success. These programs include:

**Tutoring** Horizons for Youth offers private tutoring for students in need of extra help in certain subject areas. Program tutors have been selected for their experience and training, and tutoring support is tailored to the needs of each student.

**Counseling** On occasion it is necessary for a student to access the services of a trained counselor. Horizons for Youth works with just such counselors to insure the well being of our students.

**Summer Academic Program** This program provides students with classes in reading, writing, and mathematics during the summer. Students work with specially selected teachers in small groups to improve their skills in order to combat summer learning loss and return to school better prepared academically. Transportation and meals are provided in order to limit all barriers to the students' success.



**High School Preparation and Transition Planning** Applying to a quality high school in Chicago is a complicated process. Horizons for Youth works with the families to arrange high school visits and provide guidance to insure students meet all defined application deadlines for selective enrollment, charter and private high schools. By developing relationships with the schools as well as the students, we are able to help families decide among the dozens of schools available to choose the best fit for their children.



**College Preparation Activities** In addition to insuring an excellent education for our students, we provide a comprehensive college readiness program. This program includes admission test preparation, guidance throughout the application process, campus visits and advisory services regarding financial aid.

With over 100 students currently enrolled in our programs, we continually have the opportunity to smile at our students' successes and delight in their achievements. As each new report card is delivered and school acceptance letter received, we congratulate our students on a job well done. Although academic proficiency is not among the criteria for acceptance to our program, many of our students do perform at the top of their class, while others struggle with various learning disabilities. Most are average students who need a great deal of support to reach their academic goals. As demonstrated by the success of our alumni, all children can be successful if given the tools and support needed to reach their full potential. From small to big successes, we take each student's achievement as an expansion of their potential.

First-grader, Maria, was a shy girl as she entered into elementary school. With the help of a Horizons for Youth tutor, she learned to read and understand math, allowing her nerves in class to subside and delight in the ability to declare that she was smart! What a perfect way for a child to begin their academic career.

Richard, an eighth-grader in our program, is a good student but felt a bit out of place in middle-school. Although he tried a variety of activities, including running track and playing drums, he began to lose focus as he struggled with finding his identity. With the help of his art teacher, Richard soon discovered a talent for drawing, and soon his confidence in all his class work began to soar. Once he developed a portfolio, he applied to the Chicago Academy for Arts High School and was accepted with a full scholarship.

With the support of family, teachers and the Horizons for Youth community, these two students were able to find success in new areas, which is exactly what Horizons for Youth aims for with each of our students.

## Notes to Financial Statements, June 30, 2009

### Nature of Organization

Horizons for Youth is an Illinois not-for-profit corporation formed to provide educational and personal support for children from financially disadvantaged families throughout the Chicago area. Among the programs offered by Horizons for Youth are a financial scholarship program, a child enrichment program, a summer program, and a mentoring program.

### Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

#### Basis of Presentation

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendation of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position according to three classes of net assets; unrestricted net assets, which represents the expendable resources that are available for operations at management's discretion; temporarily restricted net assets, which represents resources restricted by donors as to purpose or by passage of time; and permanently restricted net assets, which represents resources whose use by the organization is limited by donor imposed stipulations that neither expire by passage of time nor can be fulfilled or otherwise removed by actions of the organization. Temporarily restricted net assets amounted to \$3,837 at June 30, 2009, and the Organization had no permanently restricted net assets at June 30, 2009.

#### Restricted and Unrestricted Revenue

Contributions received are recorded as increases in unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted net assets, depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. Temporarily restricted contributions whose restrictions are met into the same reporting period are included in unrestricted support. Temporarily restricted contributions from prior periods whose restrictions are met are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as temporarily restricted net assets released from restrictions. Horizons for Youth has not received any contributions with donor imposed restrictions that would result in permanently restricted net assets.

#### Promises to Give

Unconditional promises to give are recognized as revenues or gains in the period received and as assets, decreases of liabilities, or expenses depending on the form of the benefits received. Conditional promises to give are recognized only when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met and the promises become unconditional. Unconditional promises to give were \$31,426 at June 30, 2009. All of the pledges are expected to be collected during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2010.

#### Donated Services

\$141,692 of in kind contributions were included in the financial statements as income and related off-setting expense during the year ended June 30, 2009. These amounts consisted of tuition reductions and pro bono or reduced professional services rendered to Horizons for Youth. A substantial number of unpaid volunteers have made significant contributions of their time to develop Horizons for Youth Programs. Their contributions include the organization of child enrichment activities and parent program events, solicitation of financial support, monitoring the performance of children in the program, service as "Big Siblings" to the children, and planning various special events. Horizons for Youth tracked volunteer hours for organization outings, events and services rendered by the Board of Directors. 8,450 of total volunteer hours were tracked for the year. These services have not otherwise been included into the financial statements, as they do not meet the criteria established by SFAS NO. 116 for recording donated services. An estimated value to the organization for these donated services is \$171,113, which is based on an hourly rate of \$20.25 as established by the Independent Sector, a not-for-profit organization which supports other not-for-profit organizations.

#### Tax Status

The Organization is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. It qualifies for charitable contribution deductions under Section 170(b)(1)(iii) and has been classified as an organization that is not a private foundation under Section 509(a)(1). All required payroll tax filings through June 30, 2009 have been filed by the Organization. The Organization has filed its US Form 990 and Illinois AG 990 IL through June 30, 2008.
