From our Executive Director

When I joined Horizons for Youth in August 2020, it didn't take long for me to realize how much I benefited from the momentum created by my predecessor, Audrey George, our Board's vision, and our internal team's unbelievable energy and commitment. Our organization was not alone navigating the uncertainty and angst of the pandemic, but these core characteristics were foundational to another year of remarkable impact and service.

As this report documents, Horizons for Youth was able to continue supporting our students and families throughout the pandemic, adapting our programs and resources to ensure educational opportunity, monitor progress, and provide meaningful assistance where needed. COVID may have changed how we engaged, but it did not diminish the transformational nature of our educational and mentoring support.

Never wavering from their commitment to prioritize Horizons' mission, our dedicated team met the moment by continuing to grow our programs and capacity. We made great strides in improving efficiency among our team and internal systems, while ensuring we never lost sight of each family and child's needs. Whether we were focused on tactical changes to program structures such as our College Program, or new strategic partnerships with community organizations who share in our mission, our staff's tireless dedication has been invigorating.

During a time when all of us were burdened with so many personal and professional challenges, our loyal donors and advocates helped us exceed our annual fundraising goal, successfully and host our marquee events, On Cloud Nine and No Ordinary Evening, virtually, and provided our students with more than \$380,000 in student tuition and resources through our Student Sponsorship Program.

And most importantly and impressively, our students persevered:

- 11 high school seniors earned 55 college acceptances
- Over \$1.4 million in college need-based or merit-based scholarships
- An impressive 96% of our Horizons students across kindergarten through 12th grade performed at or above their grade levels.

We thank all our advocates for being part of our team and helping to ensure that even in the most uncertain of times, our students and families can count on Horizons for Youth.

Adjusting to the Pandemic

Our students' changing needs throughout a hybrid year.

The global pandemic defined our 2020-2021 school year as much as it defined many of our lives. Most of our students attended school virtually or in a hybrid capacity. Our role of supporting their academic and socio-emotional needs, however, never faltered. While we had adjusted our programs to take on temporary virtual settings in early 2020, the past school year taught us that much of these adjustments weren't going anywhere any time soon. So, we kept adjusting, tweaking, and perfecting our new strategies.

Internally, our staff had to adjust to working from our homes as well. For a team that is so oriented around collaboration and support for one another, turning on our cameras for quick meetings instead of popping by one another's offices was a big adjustment. However, along with much of the rest of the world, we excelled in taking advantage of the technology that brings us together, internally and externally.

In this virtual setting, it was key that our staff kept up with the level of communication with which parents and students were used to. While we couldn't gather in person for our monthly outings, or weekly tutoring sessions, our Program Team brought new and innovative ways to keep kids engaged and learning. From internally prepared educational activity kits, or Zoom-hosted guided one-on-ones, to partner outreach for emergency family resources, we kept the underlying mission of support top of mind at all times this past year.

This ongoing pandemic has been devastating for many of those we serve. In keeping with our mission, we have been able to reaffirm the partnership that we provide for not just students, but for families, in our response to their needs this last year. Whether a strong fundraising push for the Emergency Family Fund, or a new community partner to ensure basic needs are still being met, Horizons for Youth has taken the opportunity for deepening our connection with the community we serve, even in the face of these unprecedented challenges.

Program Highlights



High School to College Transitions

Secondary and post-secondary success

In 2010, Horizons for Youth launched our High School program, which expanded our services to students in 9th-12th grades. Six years later, in 2016, we expanded once again to include a College Program. This past school year, these programs underwent strategic restructuring that allowed us to continue supporting students in the ways which we do best—focused on the individual, grounded in the overall mission. The priorities of this program are tailored to common challenges that our students face during each step, while continuing to provide individualized focus and support.

Post-secondary access and persistence have always been a central interest in Horizons for Youth's programming. We recognize the tremendous obstacles that students from under-served communities and first-generation college applicants face. Among the typical workload associated with the college prep process, these students face significant academic, financial, psychological, and professional challenges. To fulfill our mission of dismantling barriers to quality education, we structured our Post-Secondary Program to address specific barriers during this process. This program is structured into two tiers: Access and Persistence. The former begins in high school, capitalizing on the groundwork laid by years of Horizons programming, and allowing students to explore their best-fit opportunities. The latter supports students in their post-secondary journeys with academic, socio-emotional resources, and career or skill-building resources.

Most of the restructuring has been formalizing the processes with which we deliver our programming. Most notable, this has been made possible with the formal introduction of our Post-Secondary Success Program Manager. We have been able to hone in on the internal resources and external partnerships that will support our work for years to come. As we consider each student's cumulative time spent with us, we work closely with their support-system to identify their short and long-term goals and set steps towards success.



Shalanda's Scholars

Diverse learners in the program

In 2015, we envisioned dedicating specific programming towards students' different learning needs and challenges. Given the extraordinarily limited resources in so many Chicago schools, students with learning challenges were getting left behind. Even though the wraparound nature of our work has always taken diverse learning needs into account, after 25 years of working with students, we were finally able to launch a program that focused specifically on uplifting these diverse learners. Our years of results have proven that, if given the right tools, any child can persist and thrive throughout their academic careers. So, in 2016, Shalanda's Scholars launched: a program specifically dedicated to identifying, diagnosing, and supporting students with diverse learning needs long term.

This past year, we were able to introduce a Director of Academic Support Services, a role that will take Shalanda's Scholars into the next phase of growth. Perpetually, around thirty percent of our students are identified Diverse Learners. As we continue to grow the capacity of this program, we will continue to administer diagnostic testing, confirming students' specific needs or re-visiting students' progress, as well as providing specialized tutoring, from which many of our students benefit, as well as maintaining Individualized Education Plans with students' schools and support systems.

The momentum with which we finished out the 2020-2021 school year has been exhilarating. With the hard work of our program team, under the direction of the Director of Academic Support Services, 96% of Horizons students finished the year at or above their grade levels in math and reading. Coupled with the challenges of remote learning, Shalanda's Scholars are thriving thanks to the supports they receive through our programming. We continue to work towards growing capacity and innovating strategies that streamline our efficiency, all while maintaining our dedication to hands-on, personalized relationships with those we serve. Fulfilling the need for diverse learning supports is key towards fulfilling our mission.

Senior Reflections



Each year, our high school seniors give rise for celebration as we watch them cross their graduation stage. While many stages were virtual this year, we were still able to commemorate their tremendous achievements! Our 11 high school seniors earned 55 college acceptances and \$1,424,889 in merit or need-based scholarships. This equates to 89% of their cost of college attendance covered.

Students put in hard work throughout their senior year to get applications sorted and financial aid and scholarship opportunities secured. Our Annual Senior Shopping Day, sponsored by our incredible partner, OMI Industries, ensured everyone would be heading to their dorms in style. And as they continue on their post-secondary journeys, Horizons for Youth will continue offering our network of support.

Our graduate Nyla finished high school at Holy Trinity this spring, after 9 years as a Horizons student. She and her siblings are all Horizons for Youth students, ranging from 7th grade to 12th. Since the beginning, her family has been an incredibly active partner in our

programming. Nyla joined us in 3rd grade, attending Polaris Charter Academy for grade school. This fall, Nyla is attending the University of Illinois Chicago, where she'd like to major in nursing, a field we know in which she will excel.

Friendly and outgoing, Nyla has been a staple around our offices throughout high school through our paid internship program. Prior to the pandemic, she could be found greeting and directing students and parents for tutoring sessions or helping our staff with projects throughout the year.

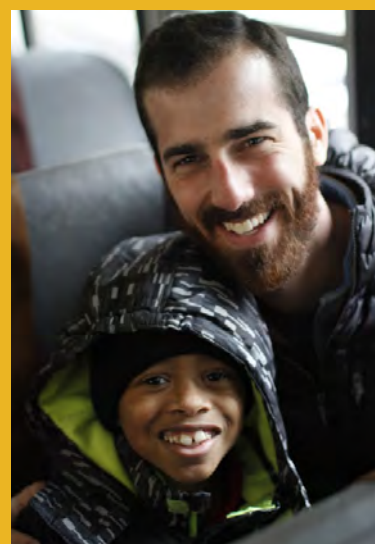
Mentors Make a Difference

Recognizing that our work cannot be done alone, our model includes the whole family. We work with our families to ensure their success in committing to the program, coach them to become advocates for their children, and provide them with networks that address their needs beyond the classroom.

Our families' needs are vast, but so is our community. By leveraging our mentor relationships, community partnerships, and corporate engagement, we find the resources our families need year over year. Our external partnerships allow our students and families the access and resources they need to build relationships in our community that will serve them for a lifetime.
